Abstraction — Abstract art is art that does not attempt to represent an accurate depiction of a visual reality but instead use shapes, colours, forms and gestural marks to achieve its effect

Atmospheric perspective-

Aerial perspective, or atmospheric perspective, refers to the effect the atmosphere has on the appearance of an object as viewed from a distance. As the distance between an object and a viewer increases, the contrast between the object and its background decreases, and the contrast of any markings or details within the object also decreases.

Graduation – To increase or decrease tone and/or strength of colour or shading.

High lights - Highlights are usually found at the highest point of an object where it is closest to the light source.

Contrast – Contrast is achieved when opposite elements are arranged together.
