Key Vocabulary

Jukebox musical - a musical featuring hit songs of a popular artist, group, or genre.

Characterisation – A description and understanding of a character's personality.

Themes – subjects within the musical.

Tableaux – a variety of freeze frames that tell a story of actors in a frozen position.

Body language – the movements and posture that the body expresses, showing attitude and feelings of the character.

Facial expressions – the emotion the actor presents on their face throughout the performance, giving the audience clear understanding of characters emotions.

Lighting - Basic objective for stage lighting is to show the performers, sets and props so the audience can clearly see everything they are meant to see onstage.

Projection - When projecting you are extending your voice outwards, beyond you. Sometimes, in learning to project, it can be helpful to imagine your voice going out to the back of the audience in an auditorium or to the back of the classroom.

Dialogue - Dialogue is a conversation between two or more people.

Slow motion – slowed pace of movement.
