Dear Parents and Carers

Another term down and we are on the home straight to exams! It's been a packed term full of lots of student successes and what better way to celebrate than with a round of ACE assemblies! I have never seen so many certificates awarded and the total for the week exceeds 4000 at least. Huge congratulations to our students for their hard work and perseverance.

Next week we have our complement of Easter revision sessions for Year 11; please see the relevant communication from the Head of Year 11, Mr Nolde. My thanks go to Mr Nolde and

colleagues delivering these sessions during the holiday to help support our Year 11s as they approach their final exams.

This week we have begun the works on our new multi-faith room. Our students have been asking for this and I'm delighted to be able to dedicate a space for the school community to use for faith and prayer purposes. After Easter, students will contribute their ideas in how it is to be developed in terms of decoration and furnishing. This greatly benefits young people helping them gain new skills and self-confidence. They ask volunteers to volunteer for approximately **48 hours** (12 days 9.30am – 2.30pm including a one-hour lunch break) although they are welcome to offer to do more hours if needed. Year 10 Child Development students have also been busy cooking. As part of their coursework they have to plan and prepare two dishes suitable for a 4 year old in a nursery which meet their nutritional requirements. In Health and Social Care we had an external OCR moderator in school to moderate year 12 and 13 the coursework units. She agreed with all the grades that were given and all students who we had entered achieved a Distinction grade. Well done to all students involved for their hard work.

We also had two visitors from Vibe Southend come to visit. Vibe is a social club for adults with learning disabilities. At Vibe Southend they provide high quality support, enabling people with learning difficulties to explore and express their creativity and interests to their fullest potential. Rita and Andrea from Vibe came to talk to our year 12 Health and Social Care students about what the centre offers and some potential roles as a 'befriender' at the centre. Our students were keen to find out more about the role and some potential volunteering opportunities. It was really interesting finding out what the centre has to offer, thank you Rita and Andrea for coming to visit us.

A big well done goes to the year 13 Psychology and Sociology students who have worked really hard during their A level mocks. Proud of them as always.

Some year 10 RESHAPE groups had a visiting theatre company performing for them. The topic was healthy relationships and students involved themselves brilliantly with the company and were fully engaged even 5 minutes after "home time"! The afternoon started with a quiz so a special well done goes to Hewie and Luke for stepping up.

The three actors performed the play and then delivered an interactive workshop in which the behaviour of the characters was discussed. The students made some excellent contributions and observations. Well done, 10S band.

CREATIVE & EXPRESSIVE ARTS

This term in Music, we have been working on Note reading and keyboards with year 7 students, computer game music and sequencing with year 8 students and musical decades and sequencing with year 9 students. The Band Method groups have been learning music theory, and they have been learning new music to play at the Summer Concert. Songs such as 'Never Gonna Give You Up' and 'Mr Brightside' may feature!

The GCSE students have been working hard finishing off their coursework and revising for their end of year exam. And our year 11 Music Tech students have been preparing their coursework for their external submission.

The year 13 students are all finishing off their component 1 recordings and compositions in preparation for submission, by Easter.

We run extra curricular clubs every lunchtime and after school including Drumline during Monday lunchtime. These students are currently learning the percussive and rhythmic parts for the new concert band.

Our Sax Quartet and Flute group are rehearsing on Tuesday lunchtimes, as well as our KS4 pop group. We have Clarinet and brass groups on Wednesdays, and KS3 pop and rock groups. Our choir are rehearsing on Thursdays and string group on Friday.

After school, We have Monday coursework catch up for GCSE Music, Level 2 Music Technology and A level students. On Wednesday, we run the school concert band, from 3pm until 4pm. And on Thursdays we run the school Jazz/ Show band from 3pm until 4pm. If your child is learning any of these instruments in school, then please encourage them to get involved with these activities.

DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

Our younger students have recently been learning Two Point Perspective drawing techniques in Product Design and will soon be creating their models digitally using Sketch Up. Resistant Materials students have just started the make element of their projects including Bug Hotels, Tablet Stands and Pewter Cast Jewellery.

Our year 10 D&T students have all commenced this half term learning their specialist content for their chosen material areas. We currently offer 3 specialism areas of Papers and Boards, Timbers and Manufactured Boards and Textiles. These are all linked with projects that will help them to get the most out of their learning for the exam, but also gives them an understanding of how to approach an NEA.

Year 12 Three Dimensional Design students continue on their design and make of a hypothetical Tram Stop for the City of Southend. They have been learning how to use CAD programmes such as 2D Design so that they can use the laser cutter to model more complex components.

Year 13 Three Dimensional Design students have just begun the preparation work for their exam piece which they will sit at the beginning of May in a 15 hour practical exam. They are busy researching and designing using the contextual challenges that have been set by the exam board and how they will interpret that in an architectural sense.

MATHEMATICS & BUSINESS STUDIES

Year 11 Mathematics

Firstly I want to say a massive well done to all of Year 11 studdents for the hard work they put in leading up to and then during their Maths March Mock Papers. An amazing amount of revision online was seen for both of these papers, as well as excellent attendance to revision after school. In the first two weeks of March, Year 11 alone have answered over 8000 MathsWatch questions and watched 750 MathsWatch clips whilst revising.

Then during the actual mock assessments, the whole year group were utterly fantastic in the way they conducted themselves and the effort they put in across the two papers. Loads of progress was seen from the previous mocks back in December. Still 5 full school weeks after the Easter break to continue this progress until the first Maths GCSE Paper 1 (non-calculator) on Friday 19th May.

Even during the Easter break students will have two physical GCSE papers to take home to work on. With these we will send out links to worked solutions and mark schemes, so students are able to access these if unsure or needing to mark their work. Also from now on, each fortnight year 11 maths classes will have a **set of 3 papers** set on MathsWatch to work through. These give instant feedback, marking the paper as a student works through it, plus giving an estimated grade as the marks are tallied up. By the time of the first paper in May, all students will have access to over 15 MathsWatch GCSE papers that they can be working on. Students can ask for teacher support by typing to their teacher under each question, if they need to.

Finally, Maths revision has and will always be running on Wednesdays after school. Students attending have been given their own Pearsons (Edexcel) exam board revision resource, which they will be able to keep and take home a few week after Easter.

Year 11 Business

Well done to all the students that have been attending business revision after school on Thursdays each week. This will continue from now until the summer exams. Keep up the hard work!

Year 12/13

Let's not forget year 12 and 13 students who were also exceptional whilst taking Mocks in the run up to their summer exams. A-Level Maths, Business and Economics students in year 13, as well as the year 12 classes taking the one year CORE Maths course. Keep up the hard work. Not long left now.

Maths Feast Competition.

Congratulations to the eight year 10 students who were part of the online Maths Feast competition. We had two teams of 4 competing against teams from other schools across the region. The tasks went on for 2/3 hours with non-stop problem solving and teamwork. The students worked exceptionally well and did the school proud.

Maths Student Survey

Around two weeks ago all students across years 7-11 were emailed a *Mathematics Student Survey* to their school email account. Thanks for the responses to that so far. If any students have yet to respond, it will remain open during the Easter break. On average it takes only 1 minute to fill in.

UKMT Junior Challenge (United Kingdom Mathematics Trust)

Towards the end of April we will have some students competing in the Junior Mathematical Challenge (year 7 and 8) which is a 60-minute, multiple-choice Challenge.

It encourages **mathematical reasoning**, **precision of thought**, and **fluency** in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

The problems on the Junior Mathematical Challenge are **designed to make students think**, so we are looking forward to that. It will be online which students will be able to access from home. Details will go out to students in lessons. Ms Basak will be running training sessions in preparation for this on Thursdays after school in M11.

Reminder of Assessments for KS3 Maths (Years 7, 8 and 9)

In the first week back after Easter all classes in S, B and H bands of years 7/8/9 will have their half term assessment. The first lesson back will be revision in class and the second will be the assessment in class. All students will have revision tasks set on MathsWatch which they should be working on already and during Easter so they ready for that assessment. The revision task and assessment cover topics recently studied in lessons.

We hope everyone has a fantastic Easter break and look forward to seeing the students again in April when we return.

As of Monday 13th March, it was just 7 school weeks until students GCSE examinations will start. As part of the process in preparing them, departments are providing extra sessions to help students (see below). Students should be completing two hours of their own revision a day (attending revision after school counts as independent revision) in addition to attending school every day. It is recommended that students are completing 90 minutes' worth of revision per subject each week (E.g., if students are taking 7 subjects =10.5 hours of revision per week). Students understand we want them to have a balance in their approach and they should have created an independent revision timetable that suits them. At this current time students will be feeling the pressure, please reassure them that they need to trust the process. As long as they are doing the right things consistently then they will be rewarded come results day. Please reassure them that thousands of students have been through this process before and thousands more are feeling the same as them right now. I have recently emailed out two support guides – one for students and one for family to support our students.
