WHAT IS A VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE?

Told in two acts, Arthur Miller's play A View from the Bridge (1955) tells the story of Eddie Carbone, an Italian American Longshoreman whose household is upended by the arrival of his wife's cousins from Italy. Their arrival sets in motion a chain of events that leads, unexpectedly, to Eddie's dramatic undoing.

Italy in the 1950s was a very poor country. The country had suffered huge losses in WW2 and the economy was extremely slow to grow. With no jobs and very few prospects, many opted to illegally immigrate to America. Many immigrants came to America with ideas of fulfilling their own American Dream, which declares that freedoms, prosperity, success, and social mobility, can all be achieved through hard work.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR:

Arthur Miller (1915-2005) was an American playwright and essayist. Amongst his most popular plays are Death of a Salesman, (1949) The Crucible (1953) and A View from the Bridge (1955). Miller worked in the Brooklyn shipyards for two years in young adulthood, where he befriended the Italian Americans he worked with. There, he heard stories of men coming over to work and being betrayed, which inspired this play!

Marco—Beatrice's older cousin from Italy

Rodolfo— Rodolpho is Beatrice's young, blond cousin from Italy and Marco's brother.

Alfieri—a lawyer that narrates the play and offers Eddie advice

The American Dream—the ideal of finding wealth in America
