GCSE English

Subject Information.

Our exam board is **Edexcel**. There are **four** exams at the end of the two year course:

English Language-

- Paper 1 Fiction and imaginative writing.
- Paper 2 Non- Fiction and transactional writing.

English Literature-

- Paper 1 Shakespeare and a modern play.
- Paper 2 novel and poetry.



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English Language-

The questions centre around unseen texts, both fiction and non-fiction, and the main skills learnt are:

- Analysing language and structure and being able to apply the correct terminology to those parts of written text.
- Evaluating how well a writer gets their message across in a text.
- Comparing how two writers and their forms of writing tackle the same topic.
- Producing similar pieces of writing for particular audiences.



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English Language-

Students will also complete a short spoken task, that provides a certificate confirming a level of verbal communication skill to future educators or employers.



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English Literature–

Students will read :

A Christmas Carol.

Romeo and Juliet.

An Inspector Calls.

A collection of 15 poems.

There is also an element of unseen poetry.

The questions are either character or theme essays, and some analysis of extracts taken from the Shakespeare play and the novel.

The poetry questions require comparison of two poems studied and two unseen poems.
