# GCSE Religious and Thematic Studies



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The examination board is AQA, and we study the **Religious Studies A** course.

#### What will I study on this course?

- Paper 1: beliefs and practices Buddhist and Christian beliefs and practices.
- Paper 2: thematic studies
  - Theme A: Family and relationships
  - Theme B: Life issues
  - Theme D: War and peace
  - Theme E: crime and punishment.

#### **Examinations**

- You will sit **TWO** 1 hour and 45-minute examinations at the end of year 11.
- You will use philosophical and ethical skills including explanation, application, analysis, and evaluation.
- There is no higher or foundation tiers in Religious Studies.
- It is 100% exam. There is <u>NO</u> coursework.





## Why study GCSE Religious and Thematic Studies?

- Understanding of the world around you.
- Consideration of ethical issues that impact on our lives such as life issues and medical ethics.
- Develop skills in presenting a well-reasoned argument, analysis, and evaluation.
- Content of Religious and Thematic Studies touches on and relates to many different careers.





GCSE Religious and Thematic Studies gives you a strong foundation for A Level study in:

- Ethics, Philosophy and Religion (EPR)
- Politics
- Law
- History
- Geography
- Sociology
- Psychology



### Paper 1: beliefs and practices

- In paper 1 you will study the beliefs and practices of <u>two</u> different religions.
- The religions you will study is **Christianity** and **Buddhism**.

#### The content you will cover within these religions includes:

- Existence of the universe
- Human personality and destiny
- The problem of evil and suffering
- Good moral conduct
- Worship
- Festivals and celebrations
- Pilgrimage
- Influence and role of religion in the modern world





#### Paper 2: thematic studies

- In **paper 2** you will study FOUR philosophical and ethical themes considering the issues raised by these, and their impact and influence on the modern world.
- Students may draw upon Christianity, Buddhism as well as other religious worldviews such as Islam and non-religious beliefs such as atheism and humanism.

#### The content you will cover within thematic studies is:

- **Theme A:** Family and relationships including study of marriage, divorce, cohabitation gender roles and discrimination.
- **Theme B:** Life issues including abortion, euthanasia, animal rights and use and abuse of the environment.
- **Theme D:** War and peace including war, weapons of mass destruction and pacifism
- **Theme E:** crime and punishment including aims of punishment, causes of crime, types of crime, treatment of criminals and corporeal and capital punishment.



#### What will the examinations look like?

- The examinations are structured the same as you have been doing in Year 7-9 Religious Studies.
- There is a total of **96 marks** per paper, plus **6 marks** for spelling, punctuation, and grammar **(SPaG).**

#### <u>Questions</u>

- Each religion and theme have a **common structure** of questions of **1,2,4, 5 and 12 marks**.
- Each component exam is worth **50%** of the final GCSE grade.



#### Career progression

- Study of GCSE Religious and Thematic Studies will assist with any profession that requires people skills or working with the public such as police, medical profession, care work, PR etc.
- You are developing knowledge about the wider world around you as well as ethical and philosophical issues in the world around you.
- You will develop problem solving skills, giving a sustained argument, analysis and evaluation among other skills covered on this course. Such skills are useful for any future career you may pursue.





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#### **Results in GCSE Religious Studies**

In summer 2023, **87.8%** of students studying GCSE Religious Studies achieved a **Grade 4+**, **81.6%** of students achieved **Grade 5+**, **42.9%** of students achieving a **Grade 7-9**.

Both results in Religious Studies were above national average with 83% of students nationally achieve Grade 4+ and 34% of students nationally achieving a Grade 7-9.
