Examinations

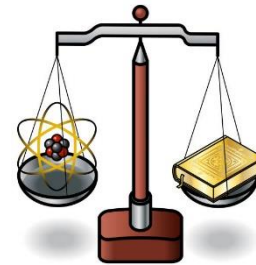
- You will sit **TWO** 1 hour and 45-minute examinations at the end of year 11.
- You will use philosophical and ethical skills including explanation, application, analysis, and evaluation.
- There is no higher or foundation tiers in Religious Studies.
- It is 100% exam. There is **NO** coursework.



GCSE Religious and Thematic Studies

Why study GCSE Religious and Thematic Studies?

- Understanding of the world around you.
- Consideration of ethical issues that impact on our lives such as life issues and medical ethics.
- Develop skills in presenting a well-reasoned argument, analysis, and evaluation.
- Content of Religious and Thematic Studies touches on and relates to many different careers.

GCSE Religious and Thematic Studies

Paper 1: beliefs and practices

- In **paper 1** you will study the beliefs and practices of **two** different religions.
- The religions you will study is **Christianity** and **Buddhism**.

The content you will cover within these religions includes:

- Existence of the universe
- Human personality and destiny
- The problem of evil and suffering
- Good moral conduct
- Worship
- Festivals and celebrations
- Pilgrimage
- Influence and role of religion in the modern world



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Paper 2: thematic studies

- In **paper 2** you will study FOUR philosophical and ethical themes considering the issues raised by these, and their impact and influence on the modern world.
- Students may draw upon Christianity, Buddhism as well as other religious worldviews such as Islam and non-religious beliefs such as atheism and humanism.

The content you will cover within thematic studies is:

- **Theme A:** Family and relationships including study of marriage, divorce, cohabitation gender roles and discrimination.
- **Theme B:** Life issues including abortion, euthanasia, animal rights and use and abuse of the environment.
- **Theme D:** War and peace including war, weapons of mass destruction and pacifism
- **Theme E:** crime and punishment including aims of punishment, causes of crime, types of crime, treatment of criminals and corporeal and capital punishment.



GCSE Religious and Thematic Studies

What will the examinations look like?

- The examinations are structured the same as you have been doing in Year 7-9 Religious Studies.
- There is a total of **96 marks** per paper, plus **6 marks** for spelling, punctuation, and grammar (**SPaG**).

Questions

- Each religion and theme have a **common structure** of questions of **1,2,4, 5 and 12 marks**.
- Each component exam is worth **50%** of the final GCSE grade.
