Are you interested in finding out more about a specific topic that interests you? Do you want to broaden your understanding of a current issue? Do you want to produce a research project describing and investigating a topic of personal relevance to you? Yes? Then the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) is for you.

The EPQ is a stand-alone qualification which enables students to broaden their understanding of an area of study of their choosing. Completed over one year the qualification is equivalent to one half of an A level.

By developing and building your own project you will build skills in independent and collaborative research, presentation, critical thinking and analysis, time management, teamwork and negotiation. These valuable life skills are transferable across all aspects of your Level 3 qualifications, across all disciplines, and will prepare you for the world of work or further studies at University or in a Higher-Level Apprenticeship.
